Neighbors Does Not Take Being Endorsed By the AFL-CIO Lightly

Born to sharecroppers in rural North Carolina, Rick knows the joys and struggles of working to achieve the American dream. His father was a veteran of WWII and the Korean War. During WWII, his mother made ammunition and afterwards worked the graveyard shift in spinning mills.

Following in his father's footsteps, Rick joined the Army at age 17 and served three tours in Vietnam. After his career in the army, Rick returned to school and earned a B.A. in Political Science thanks to financial assistance from a small ministerial scholarship and his G.I. Bill. After graduation in 1979, Rick took a job at a Wrangler plant in Hackleburg, Alabama that resulted in a 35-year career in the apparel industry. During his employment at the plant, Rick met his wife, Judy, who worked alongside him in apparel.

Rick and Judy have been blessed with three children, five grandchildren, and four great-granddaughters. Rick has spent most of his adult life in the apparel business and as an international businessman and negotiator. He recently returned to school, earning an MBA and graduate certification in Project Management from the University of North Alabama.

On Friday, August 7th 2020 Rick was invited to speak to a room of astute Business Managers that collectively came together for an annual meeting allowing Mr. Neighbors to speak to the audience of seasoned union members and leaders across the state of Alabama. It was humbling to watch him address his last two unsuccessful runs for US Congress against the 12 term Aderholt in the 4th District but equate his perseverance to that of the organized labor's mission. He expressed his strong desire that began in 2010 to begin addressing issues he saw as problematic for the people in his district, compared it to the struggles the AFL-CIO has faced and overcame in the decades before. He promised to work hard to restore livable wages and benefits that would bring back dignity and opportunity to all who struggle to make ends meet.
